
The committee is elected by the members of the association. Once elected, each committee member has to stand down or be re-elected every year. We always encourage new **blood to join and provide new impetus to the association.**

After pursuing a 30+ year career in the Norfolk Constabulary I took up a post as lecturer at the College of West Anglia in 1994. Whilst there I obtained various teaching qualifications together with a Master of Science Degree from Leicester University, which ultimately led to a 6 year period of lecturing with The Open University.

I took up bee-keeping in the late 1960's, well before Varroa, six WBC's, all second-hand and mostly begged or borrowed from the back of sheds belonging to people who had 'kept' bees many years earlier in order to obtain the government sugar allowance during rationing. Life and career intruded after some five years or so and I left the craft only to return again some ten years ago


when Lorraine and I decided that we would have two hives in the garden; we were mentored in this by that wonderful gentleman the late Bill Disdle.

I was a member of the Association in the 1960's and re-joined immediately upon my return to bee-keeping Like Topsy however the number of colonies we had quickly grew as did our involvement with the Association. I became Education Coordinator whilst Lorraine took on the role of Secretary for a time and together with Jill Tinsey formed the Education sub-committee. Lorraine and I presented and ran the Beginners Course for six years. Also during this time we set up and ran the Taster Sessions for three seasons.

I played a role in establishing our first Association Apiary at the site we shared with Keith Morgan at Flitcham and then along with Brian Gemmell was instrumental in obtaining and equipping our club apiary at Blackborough End. I finally retired from the committee two years ago.

I have also played a part in bee-keeping at a national level, initially as part of the original 'think tank' for formalising education with BBKA, even giving a lecture on presentation skills as part of the Teach the Teacher forum at the Spring Convention at Stoneleigh, proudly wearing my WNKLBA sweater. I was also a member of the Healthy Bee Project with FERA for two years and secretary for the Council of National Bee-keeping Associations in the United Kingdom and Ireland (CONBA) for a similar period. I remain a Trustee for the EARS Research Project.

I was particularly delighted and proud to have been elected as President of our Association and look forward to supporting the Committee in their efforts to continue the progress already made in its programme to develop and improve the standards of its members, particularly in the recognition and treatment of disease. I am also thrilled to be able to have an input into the planned leasing and development of the Blackborough End Apiary . I also hope to see further efforts being made to include more of our membership in both bee related and social events and the encouragement of bee-keepers that are not yet members to attend some of our events so that standards of care and abilities can constantly be reviewed and improved. 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Peter Davies – Chairman



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Patrick Duhig – Treasurer





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Stuart Grant - Spray Liaison Officer








Keith keeps many colonies in West Norfolk where he manages to combine bee-keeping with his duties as a bee inspector and also attending to markets as far afield as London.


Key Winks – Sales and Distribution

Sir Henry Bellingham MP – Vice President




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


Attended Eton and then Magdelene College, Cambridge where he gained a degree in law in 1977 - taking a short service commission in the Guards for a year between school and university. He trained at the Inns of Court School of Law, and joined the Middle Temple in 1978 and practised as a barrister for eight years. He first entered Parliament at the 1983 election, but lost his seat at the 1997 election. Nonetheless, he contested same seat at the election in 2001, and won it back. He was re-elected in 2005 with a 9000 vote majority.

Henry Bellingham was appointed as a Shadow Minister for Trade and Industry in July 2002, before becoming an Opposition Whip in May 2005. Since November 2006 he has been a Shadow Minister for the Department of Constitutional Affairs. He lives in his constituency, in the village of Burnham Market. He married Emma Whiteley in August 1993 in Horsham, and they have a son.

Landowner and farmer Sir Jeremy Bagge has run the 1,870-acre Stradsett Estate in West Norfolk since 1984. The business of Stradsett Estate Farms involves extensive arable cultivation, and cattle for beef. This includes 1,065 acres of cereals, 270 acres of sugar beet, 280 acres of grassland, and 105 acres used for other purposes.

Sir Jeremy, was educated at Eton and qualified as an accountant with Touche Ross & Co in 1968. He acted as financial adviser to HIH The Crown Prince of Ethiopia in 1969-70, and was a partner of financial consultants Emson & Dudley in 1970-75 before running his own financial consultancy firm from 1975 until 1983. Sir Jeremy has held a vast number of public offices, and was High Sheriff of Norfolk in 2003-04. He is a keen supporter of local charities, and his interests also include local history, shooting, stalking, skiing, light aviation and sailing.
